

Proposition 1 Update for Boards and Commissions

By January 1, 2025, mental/behavioral health boards/commissions are encouraged to <u>update membership</u> <u>rosters and bylaws</u> to comply with CA law (changes to CA Welfare and Institution Code (WIC).

Summary of Changes (Changes are in **bold**.)

- 5604. (2)(B)(i) Fifty percent of the board membership shall be consumers, or the parents, spouses, siblings, or adult children of consumers, who are receiving or have received behavioral health services. One of these members shall be an individual who is 25 years of age or younger. (ii) At least 20 percent of the total membership shall be consumers, and at least 20 percent shall be families of consumers.
- 5604. (2)(D)(i) At least one member of the board shall be an employee of a local education agency.
 - a. (ii) To comply with clause (i), a county shall notify its county office of education about vacancies on the board.
- 3. "Mental" is changed to "Behavioral". "substance use disorder" is added.

Understanding your Role

1. As Individuals:

Individuals can and should write to their state legislators! Legislators especially appreciate hearing from residents within their districts.

2. As Advisory Bodies:

Local mental/behavioral health boards/commissions are in an advisory role. In most counties, legislative advocacy is handled through the Board of Supervisors / Executive Office. Boards/commissions may wish to recommend specific legislation to their Governing Body (in most cases Board of Supervisors) and MH/BH Director (the BH Directors also advocate through their statewide association, County Behavioral Health Directors Association (CBHDA)).

Grants/Funding

Access

The National Center for Mental Health Dissemination, Implementation and Sustainment Cooperative Agreement – \$7.5 million – The National Center for Mental Health Dissemination, Implementation, and Sustainment will build the capacity of grant recipients, as well as organizations that oversee or directly provide mental health services, to improve the implementation of evidence-based change management processes that guide mental health services.

Children & Youth

<u>Cell Phones for Foster Youth</u>: "iFoster Phones for Foster Youth" are available to current and former CA Foster Youth who are between the ages of 13 and 26 inclusive whose case originated in CA or who currently reside in CA.

<u>Wellness Coach Scholarships</u> for young people: Becoming a Certified Wellness Coach lets you play a role in improving mental health and well-being of children and youth in California. Scholarships up to \$35,000 annually are available. More information is available at:

Digital Access

The California Advanced Services Fund (CASF) Broadband Public Housing Account provides grants supporting free broadband for low-income residents of eligible housing communities. The program recently expanded eligibility for types of applicants and costs that can be reimbursed. Applications are accepted semiannually, by the 1st of July and January.

Housing/Homelessness

Proposition 1 Funding: In Bond BHCIP Round 1: Launch Ready and Round 2: Unmet Needs, DHCS will distribute up to \$4.4 billion through competitive grants that aim to expand behavioral health treatment and residential settings. Of these funds, \$1.5 billion of competitive grant funding will be exclusively available to cities, counties, and tribal...

Prospective Bond BHCIP applicants are encouraged to review the <u>Program</u> <u>Update</u>, which outlines eligibility considerations, qualifying facility types, funding parameters, and match requirements in preparation for the release of the Request for Applications (RFA). Workforce

<u>Minority Fellowship Program</u> – \$15.4 million – This program aims to reduce health disparities and improve behavioral health care outcomes for racial and ethnic populations. The program also seeks to train and better prepare behavioral health practitioners to more effectively treat and serve people of different cultural and ethnic backgrounds.

Addiction Technology Transfer Centers

Cooperative Agreements – \$9.0 million – This program develops and strengthens the specialized behavioral health care and primary health care workforce that provides substance use disorder (SUD) treatment and recovery support services. This is done by accelerating the adoption and implementation of evidence-based and promising SUD treatment and recovery-oriented practices and services, heightening the awareness, knowledge, and skills of the workforce that addresses the needs of people with substance use or other co-occurring physical and behavioral health conditions, and fostering regional and national alliances among culturally diverse practitioners, researchers, policy makers, funders, and the recovery community.
